# **News and Notes**

Saudi Arabia has a problem. Too many young Arabian men have been going to Syria to fight in the civil war. There they get military training, and when they come home they have ideas of overthrowing the monarchy. That is why the government has come up with new laws that will allow them to fight their own war against terrorism.

This is perfectly understandable, but the new laws have been implemented by a royal decree that criminalizes virtually all forms of dissent and abolishes the freedoms of speech and belief. Since the nation's government is legitimized by the Wahhabi interpretation of Islam, non-believers are seen as *de facto* enemies of the Saudi state. Atheists have been classified, by definition, as terrorists.

The document that has been denounced in a report from Human Rights Watch is Royal Decree 44, which establishes who will be considered a terrorist. Article 1 identifies as terrorism "(c)alling for atheist thought in any form, or calling into question the fundamentals of the Islamic religion on which this country is based." So atheists are terrorists even if they have perpetrated no violence, nor made any threats, nor planned any actions. It would seem that anyone who is not a Wahhabi Muslim would be a threat to the state, but atheists are the only group that is defined as terrorist based upon their views of religion.

If you are a member of Minnesota Atheists, under this decree you could be arrested as soon as you set foot in Saudi Arabia. Article 4 identifies as a criminal "Anyone who aids ["terrorist"] organizations, groups, currents [of thought], associations, or parties, or demonstrates affiliation with them, or sympathy with them, or promotes them, or holds meetings under their umbrella, either inside or outside the kingdom; this includes participation in audio, written, or visual media; social media in its audio, written, or visual forms; internet websites; or circulating their contents in any form, or using slogans of these groups and currents [of thought], or any symbols which point to support or sympathy with them."

Arabia is governed by the Saud family, so royal decrees have the force of law. A person convicted of atheism could face years or even decades of prison. Saudi courts are the administration of Sharia, and legal decisions are usually based on a literal interpretation of the Qu'ran and hadiths. Saudi Arabia already has a death sentence for "apostasy", which in practice makes conversion from Islam or expression of atheism unlawful. Many who are convicted of apostasy are forced to disavow their views and undergo "re-education".

Despite the severity of religious law, Arabian society is nevertheless not religiously monolithic. A 2012 WIN/Gallup International poll found that almost a quarter of the people interviewed in Saudi Arabia described themselves as "not religious," and five per cent declared themselves to be atheists. Extrapolating that figure on a national scale suggests that around 1.4 million atheists live in Saudi Arabia – all of them considered by the government to be terrorists.

Despite this shameful record of suppression of religious liberty and freedom of expression, Saudia Arabia was recently elected a member of the United Nations Human Rights Council, continuing a takeover by the Organization of the Islamic Conference. This substantially undermines the credibility of the Council, which in recent years has focused on condemning insults to Islam rather than on exposing the nations that abuse human rights.

Yet the U.S. government has said nothing. U.S. President Barack Obama paid a state visit at the end of March, but left Riyadh apparently without raising human rights issues during talks with Saudi officials.

On April 10 House Bill 503 was passed in Louisiana, which declares the Holy Bible the official state book. The original version conferred that title on a specific 16th century copy in the Louisiana State Museum system. It was first amended to the King James Version, a Protestant bible particularly used by fundamentalists, but that was rejected by Catholic legislators. The bill now goes to the Senate.

# **Minnesota Atheist Meeting Review - April**

Greg Laden's talk on global warming nicely tied in themes of biblical disaster to the coming catastrophic changes our global home is going to visit on us even to the seventh generation. Well, not so nice, in review of the ways

that the earth's ecosystem will respond to the "sin" of overusage of carbon consumption by our industrialized economy.

The dire warnings of sea-level rise are being broadcast by people who have been studying the models of climate change. Like prophets in the wilderness, they are ignored by those of us who don't want to take responsibility for making changes. Unlike the Bible's prophets, there is no God to pray for forgiveness there are only ourselves to rely on for relief. What climatologists are discovering is that the levels of carbon expelled into the atmosphere are reaching levels correlated to historical periods of sea-level rises that will carry with them problems beyond even the catastrophes experienced by the Jews of the Old Testament.

Are we beyond the tipping point? It seems likely. Laden demonstrated that the response of the climate to the 400 parts per million density of carbon in the atmosphere has fallen within the predicted models of the IPCC (Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change,) but on the high end of predicted global and sea-level trends.

We should expect worse disasters from climate than anything modern humans have seen; flooding, drought, ocean acidification, civil unrest from people who will have to adapt forcibly to the effects of climate change and we are going to have to deal with a plague of emerald ash borers as they migrate into the upper midwest.

The relationships between religion, politics and climate denial are not easily found, according to Laden but strong indications from polling show that conservative Christians are less likely to accept the science of global climate change than any other group. The policy question, then, for activist atheists is to choose our priorities. Greg Laden asked if the survival of our species is more important than moving society away from religion. I would say that we need to solve the most pressing problems first.

This may not seem like an atheist issue, and a bit of a departure from most monthly meetings but we owe it to future generations to address it with every bit of effort we can spare; atheists, theists and all who are concerned with the quality of life on Earth should take responsibility to mitigate the effects of the alarming global disasters of biblical proportions.



#### **Minnesota Atheists Defend Planned Parenthood**

On each Good Friday, churches send hundreds of protesters to attempt to intimidate patients and disrupt work at the clinic. That might sound a bit scary, but from our smiling faces in the photos above, you can see that our representatives thoroughly enjoyed marching and visiting on the sunny afternoon. My impression of the people on the other side of the barricade is that they seemed consumed with fear and guilt. See the photos on the right side of the collage below.

Why do these Christians do this? My answer is that each has been indoctrinated to believe in the fictitious God character and the bible from early childhood. The indoctrination continues weekly at church. It is also reinforced by common symbols and sayings in our culture such as "In God We Trust", "One Nation under God", and the "God bless America" of politicians.

Christian clerics have found the combination of biblical patriarchy and the abortion issue to be useful tools to bind their flocks together. Patriarchy is the idea that the men in a family own the women as their chattel property. Is that biblical? Recall that a man's wife is listed among a man's property along with slaves and farm animals in the Ten Commandments, and "wives obey your husbands".

# **Atheists Talk Radio Report**

"Imagine There's No Heaven" was the program title for Carl Hancock's interview of Mitchell Stephens on Atheists Talk #263, April 6th, 2014. Stephens is a journalist, reporter and author of Imagine No Heaven: How Atheism Help Create the Modern World. Stephens was motivated to write this book because he found there were no good historical works on atheism, while there are thousands of books on religious history. This interview was primarily about Western culture starting with the Greeks and covering both better known and lesser known philosophers and contributors, including women. Stephens notes that women and atheists have one thing in common, that their early history was recorded by religious males who had a bias against both groups. For women, he starts with Ernestine Rose. Stephens also covers Madelyn Murray O'Hair's contributions to atheism and the fight for separation of government and religion.

"Minnesota Marriage Officiant Bill", August Berkshire on Atheists Talk #264, April 13, 2014.

Stephanie Zvan interviewed August Berkshire on the push by Minnesota Atheists to update the Minnesota marriage officiant statutes to accommodate atheists and secular humanists. This effort was reported in The Minnesota Atheist newsletter last issue. August and Stephanie reported that this is the first known time in Minnesota that atheists have asked for recognition in law for our nonreligious lifestyle. They discussed the details of current law and how the state gives preference to religious groups that register with the state and certify ministers' credentials to represent their faith to perform marriage. Additionally, they reviewed how some atheist groups and freethought churches have found a method of legal manipulation of the law to get atheist ministers registered, but noted that this is still being done under the name of religion. This bill would allow atheist and humanists groups to certify their own representatives to perform marriages.

"Wicked Gods", the first novel by professor Eilís Leyne, was discussed on Atheists Talk #265, April 20, 2014. Scott Lohman interviewed Ms. Leyne, who had previously published non-fiction books on religion in America. She decided to write a novel to emotionally explore the pernicious role that religion can play in society: the slide towards theocracy. 'Eilis Leyne' is a pseudonym the author adopted to establish a clear separation from her academic work, but also to protect herself and her family from vilification from Christians.


